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1 FACE TO FACE OR ONLINE?

It is preferable to hold the training in person, but if this is not possible due to COVID-19, you will need to organize it online.

We have designed the training to be done in person, but we have indicated in this guide what needs to change if you use Zoom or similar.

You will need the following things in the training room:

- Good internet connection
- A good screen to view the slides on
- Speakers to be able to hear the videos
- Flipcharts and pens
- Enough room to have small group work (ideally have other spaces available)

2 WHO WILL PRESENT / FACILITATE?

The presenters and facilitators should be those people that attended the Training of Trainers sessions on the 12th and the 14th of April.

Optional: If you have expert UHC champions in your community, consider inviting them to be a guest speaker! For



example, Baby Rivona in Indonesia, or Anton Basenko in the Ukraine.

3 WHO TO INVITE?

When deciding to invite, consider how many people you can have at the training without it becoming too large a group. The ideal number is between 10-30.

Here are some suggestions of who to invite:

- Members of all key population networks, including PLHIV, YPHIV, WLHIV networks
- Partner organisations working in HIV and SRHR, especially those working with LBGTQ, sex workers, people who use drugs and marginalized populations
- From the above groups, people with experience of doing advocacy, especially with policymakers, civil servants and Parliamentarians

TIP: At the end of the meeting, ask the participants if they agree to be part of a whatsapp group to stay in touch with one another, share videos and updates

4 FACILITATION TIPS

Read through the slides and notes in advance so you know what you are going to say and how the group exercises and small groups will work.



Divide up the task of facilitating so that one person is not presenting all the time.

What to do if you don't know the answer to a question?

Say you don't know but will ask GNP+ to find out.

It is helpful to have a flipchart available to capture issues and questions that come up ('parking-lot') so that these can be addressed or answered later.

If people are not contributing to the discussion, go back a step and ask people about their personal experiences of using health services. From there guide it back to why we need UHC to address the weaknesses in the health system.
