What does your PLHIV Stigma Index data say about access to health, integration of services and quality of care? Focus on questions that address general health status, healthcare service delivery, quality of healthcare and abuses of human rights within healthcare. These are generally found in Section E: interactions with Healthcare Services.

Question 36: How many people declared that they had been diagnosed with other health conditions in the past 12 months? This question helps you make the case for people-centred approaches				
Question 37: How many people said they had been offered treatment for other health conditions? This question helps you identify gaps in integration of services

These questions will help you understand how people experience health services				
Question 38: How many people go to community-led care for their regular HIV care and treatment? This question helps you make the case for community-led care				
Question 39: How many people said they knew of a community-led HIV clinic? As above.				
Question 42: How many people sought healthcare for non-HIV related health needs? This question helps you identify the need for integrated services

<p>Question 43: How many people reported abuse of their human rights when seeking <u>non-HIV related</u> health care?</p> <p>This question helps you identify where the problems are</p>				
<p>Question 44: How many people said that they do not report their HIV status when seeking general health care?</p> <p>This question helps you identify who is being left behind</p>				
<p>Question 45: How many people said that they do not think their medical records are kept confidential?</p> <p>This question helps you identify specific gaps in quality of care</p>				
<p>Question 46: How many people said that a healthcare professional had abused their human rights because of their HIV status?</p> <p>This question helps you identify specific gaps in quality of care</p>				
<p>Question 47: How many women said that a health care professional had abused their human rights because of their HIV status?</p> <p>This question helps you identify specific problems in integrating HIV and reproductive health services</p>
